5 Things You May Not Know About Pastors

Pastors are set apart

- You may wish for a warmer, closer relationship with your pastor than is possible.
- Pastors are trained and retrained on boundaries.
- We want to be friendly. We do fall in love with you - even the toughest ones among you!
- But it will be rare that we will become your friend. The stakes are too high from the appearance of favoritism, the possibility of a falling out, the need to appropriately avoid any temptations to cross boundaries of fidelity, etc.

Our Holidays become Your Holidays

- Thursday of Thanksgiving is inevitably before the first Sunday of Advent making a trip unlikely
- Christmas Eve gets us home late after a week of Sunday Service, Blue Christmas, Christmas Eve services - we don't get to celebrate them with our extended families - especially if Christmas is close to Sunday.
- Holy Week Services, Easter Sunrise, Easter Services - Easter nap!
- In 20 years, I haven't spent a holiday with my mother or my siblings.
- We prepare you for your holidays, but those days are often a day of rest for us.

We become nuclear families

- Our work pulls us from communities where we have built up life and friendships - if we are second career clergy, and first career clergy don't have that. It's not unusual to hear first career clergy speak about a "college friend that they are close to".
- Family picnics happen on Saturdays and Sundays when we are busiest. We have to choose between taking time for normal family events and vacations.
- Whoever our household is becomes our family. We don't live down the road from a parent or a child or a cousin or a sibling. We live where we are asked to go.
- Your houses are often nice - some are less so - but we do not get to pick them. We need to make them work for us as they are.

Clergy are highly vetted. (I ran through the process of ordination and it took me 7 years.)

- Err on the Side of Trust
- Start out trusting a bit more than you normally would. Be a little crazy with your trust!
- Let your trust be cumulative.
- Assume that we have misremembered rather than lied. That we have forgotten instead of intentionally left undone those things which we ought to have done.

Pastors are - by their work - continuously vulnerable

- preparation of worship and sermons
- in meetings
- in church social events
- we put ourselves out there to you, we keep ourselves open to the Holy Spirit - being that open can make criticism sting far more. Correction is, of course, necessary, but be kind.
- You, in turn, are not required to be vulnerable with us; that is a choice you can make or not

**History Comes Alive
At The
United Methodist Church of Lake Ronkonkoma**



On July 9, 1942, the Women's Society of Christian Service sponsored an "Open House" at the Parish Hall. This Thursday night social event was opened to the soldiers who were camped at Lake Ronkonkoma on a piece of land owned by Fitsgreen Hallock. The twelve soldiers who attended the first open house enjoyed games and dancing. Coke and root beer were served. Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Giardet chaired the event which continued into the fall. Reverend William F. Davis, Jr. wrote, "Our young people put on a heroic program for the soldiers in the local encampment. and realized quite a bit of success."

**History Comes Alive
At The
United Methodist Church of Lake Ronkonkoma**



Rev. Edward S. Belden of the Lakeville Methodist Episcopal Church of Brookhaven (UMCLR) created quite a stir in August 1906 when he complained that the playing of baseball on Sunday violated the law and disturbed "the peace of the Sabbath." Rev. Belden swore out warrants which were signed by Justice of the Peace Morris M. Hawkins. Deputy Sheriff Isaac Bedell of Sayville used the warrants to arrest Artie Wickers (pitcher) and William Hope (first base of a New York City team playing at Lake Ronkonkoma. Sheriff Bedell waited until the 11-inning game was over before making the arrests. (Lake Ronkonkoma won 1-0).

From a newspaper account of the day we read, "the Methodist minister and his church people alleged in court that the ball players advertised their games in advance, and took entrance money, at the gate of the grounds, in violation of the law"

The arrested ball players pled not guilty and Justice Hawkins held them for trial. Justice M.M. Hawkins, who issued the warrants, is a prominent member of the famous Ronkonkoma team, but is strongly opposed to Sunday baseball playing.

A jury trial was held and witnesses spoke both for and against Sunday baseball. Counselor Aldcroft (for the defendants), quoting from the New Testament, incited Lawyer Pelletreau (for the complainants) to quote not only from the New, but from the Old Testament Scriptures as well. The complainant's counsel regarded all Sunday baseball playing as against Divine command, as well as forbidden by law. The defendant's counsel, reviewing these points gave reverse interpretations. Counselor Aldcroft made an ingenious address to the jury, which caused hearty applause from the defendant's side. Mr. Pelletreau summed up his side with characteristic force and eloquence.

After an hour's deliberation, the jury came in with the announcement that it was impossible to reach an agreement.

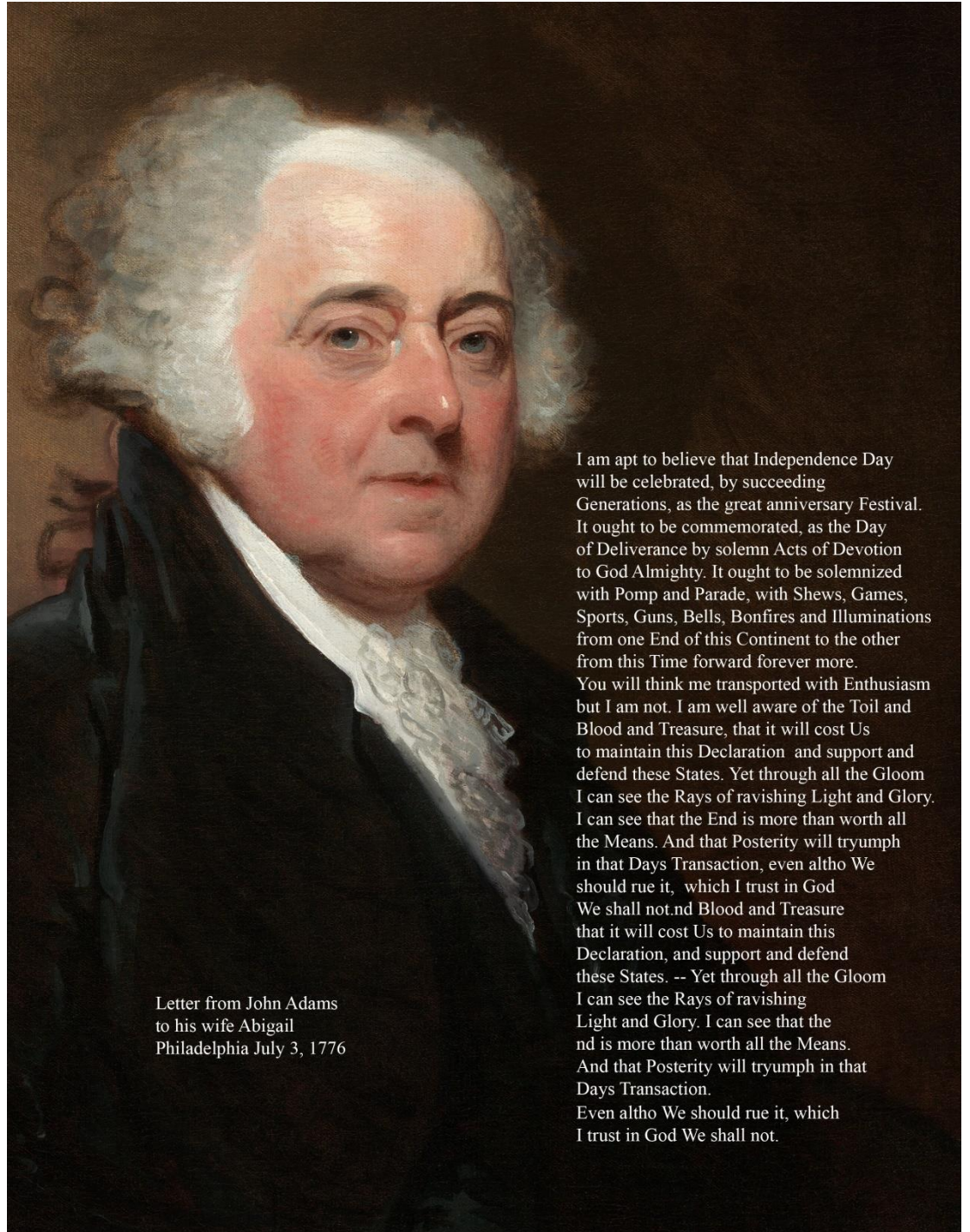
The issue of playing baseball on Sunday was settled in Albany when a bill was passed permitting amateurs to play public baseball between 1pm and 6pm on Sunday.

Letter from John Adams
to his wife Abigail
Philadelphia July 3, 1776
